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FROM THE SWITCHBOARD

The College Switchboard is opened for regular service at 7:00 every morning and is closed at 11:00 each night. Between 11:00 p.m. and 7:00 a.m. the Night Policeman takes all calls that may come in to the College but is, in no sense, acting as telephone operator. He is not expected to put through a call to any member of the Community. The Night Policeman refers any case of emergency to the College official who is in charge and responsible for handling emergencies.

In case of an emergency which necessitates the making of an outside call by a Community member, he or she will have to go to the Night Policeman's Booth to make the call, or to the pay stations in Canfield, Kilpatrick or the hall outside Commons.

There is a 10¢ charge for each personal local call and all personal calls made from non-restricted telephones should be reported to the Switchboard. All long distance calls and telegrams must be placed through the Switchboard or reported to the Switchboard as soon as possible. All telegrams should be written on telegraph blanks, which are kept on the counter near the Switchboard, and handed to the Operator. Telegrams cannot be taken over the telephone by the Switchboard Operator.

When you place a long-distance call which cannot be completed immediately, please stay near your telephone or notify the Operator where you can be reached.
