His instruments are also heard in the Oslo Philharmonic, Deutsche Kammerphilharmonie, Austrian Radio Orchestra, Linz Philharmonic, Bavarian Radio Symphony, La Scala Opera Orchestra, Bergen Harmonien, and Goteberg Symphony.
