REMINDER FROM THE OFFICE OF THE DEAN OF STUDIES: All students except graduating seniors and students who have been accepted for the London Program are expected to register for courses for next term by 5:00 P.M. on Wednesday, May 27. Failure to do so will subject them to a cumulative fee for late registration. Students who plan to take a leave from the college or to withdraw from it will be exempted from fees for late registration and non-registration <u>only</u> if they inform the office of the Dean of Studies of their intentions by May 27.
