*NOTED TRANSLATOR AND CLASSICIST DAVID GRENE

Renowned classicist and translator, David Grene, will present a lecture on Sophocles' Antigone, entitled "The Puzzle of Antigone." Grene is currently engaged in translating a new version of Antigone. During his visit on campus, Mr. Grene will discuss his views on translation and ancient Greek tragedy in an informal seminar from 1:30 to 3:30 p.m. in Welling House Living Room. In conjunction with Mr. Grene's lecture, the Literature and Languages, Social Sciences, and Drama Divisions are also sponsoring a series of showings of the cinematic adaptation of the Greek tragedy, Antigone, featuring John Gielgud, Juliet Stevenson, and John Sharpnel. These presentations will take place from Friday, October 26 through Tuesday, October 30. See the Calendar of Events for times and places. The public is welcome to all these events free of charge. David Grene has been teaching for many years in the Committee of Social Thought at the University of Chicago. With Richmond Lattimore, he prepared the famous edition of the Complete Greek Tragedies for the University of Chicago Press. More recently, he has published a translation of Herodutus' Histories, and, with Wendy O'Flaherty, a new version of the Aeschylus Oresteia. He is also the author of Greek Political Theory, Reality and the Heroic Pattern: Last Plays of Sophocles, Shakespeare, and Ibsen, and The Actor in History: Studies in Shakespearian Stage Poetry.
