

On Schubert's Death and the Maiden

The "Death and the Maiden" Quartet owes its nickname to the great song of the same title composed seven years earlier to a text by Matthias Claudius, a dialogue between Death and the girl he has come to collect. Her passionate plea, "I am still young - pass me by," is heard after a solemn, sustained introduction. Death's tender response, "I am a friend, and do not come to punish - you will sleep sweetly in my arms," is based musically on the introductory material. For the slow movement of the quartet, Schubert combines the song introduction with part of Death's response to form a complete lyric melody, and then founds a magnificent set of five variations and a coda on it.

Ironically then, because the section of the song used here is the one that treats of Death the Comforter, the only part of the quartet explicitly linked with the subject of death is also the gentlest, most comforting movement of the four. It is in the hectic, almost feverish accents of the quicker movements that the threat of a very different Death figure - the cruel one we know from Schubert's song Der Erlkönig - makes its baleful presence felt.

It was then a few minutes before 3PM on September 11, 1973. At 6_{AM} that morning, the high command of the Chilean armed forces had mobilized some 100,000 men and launched an allout attack against the economic, political, social, and administrative centers in the country. No less than 3,000 leaders of laborers, farmers, office workers, and political parties were murdered on September 11. Between the eleventh and the fifteenth, 5,500 more were to be killed combating the rebel military forces, and some 6,300 persons would be imprisoned and shot or murdered in some other way between the twelfth and the thirtieth of September. In the first eighteen days, there were approximately 15,000 civilian casualties. Of these, slightly less than 6,000 were in Santiago: 800 murdered on the eleventh, 2,900 killed later in combat, and 2,200 shot or murdered after being taken prisoner with or without "summary trial in time of war."
