The final series—"Close-Up: Women in the Arts"—of the Women's Issues Study Group's three-part, three-month video festival will continue on Monday, May 9, with Toni Morrison: Profile of a Writer, winner of the 1993 Nobel Prize for Literature. This film includes intimate interviews and moving readings from Morrison's book Beloved, which focuses on the story of Sethe, a black slave and mother. A close-up look at Mexico's famous surrealist, Frieda Kahlo will be shown on Monday, May 16. At the age of 16, Frieda was involved in a road accident that left her in chronic pain and subject to a series of operations. Her paintings reflect her constant struggle with her ravaged body. Lady Day: The Many Faces of Billie Holiday will be shown on Monday, May 23. This is the first video documentary on the woman considered by many to be the greatest jazz singer of all time. All films will begin at 9:00 p.m. in the Upstairs Café.

Please knock on the door if a nurse is needed. In the event of an emergency when Health Service is closed, call emergency extension 210. A college physician is available Monday, Wednesday, and Friday for clinic hours. Check with Health Service for exact hours. Doctor's appointments should be arranged either through the nurse on duty or the Health Service secretary. Students who miss a doctor's appointment without prior notice will be charged \$10 for that missed appointment. Students who need to be seen by a doctor when the Health Service physician is not in attendance should contact the nurse on duty during Health Service hours or call emergency ext. 210 when Health Service is closed. A trip to the hospital emergency room without prior approval may not be covered by school insurance.
