## FROM THE PRESIDENT'S OFFICE

Edward Hallett Carr was born in London in 1892. After graduating from Trinity College, Cambridge, he entered the Foreign Office in the First World War and remained in the British Diplomatic Service for more than 20 years. During this time he was a member of the British Delegation to the Peace Conference in Paris, and later of the British Delegation to the League of Nations at Geneva.

In 1936 he was appointed Woodrow Wilson Professor of International Politics in the University of Wales -- a post which he held until 1947. During the Second World War he acted as Assistant Editor of the London Times from 1941 to 1946. Since 1947 he has been engaged on a large-scale history of Soviet Russia, of which the first volume under the title The Bolshevik Revolution has recently been published.

Among his previous books have been The Romantic Exiles, a study of Russian nineteenth-century revolutionaries in exile (1933), Michael Bakunin (1937), International Relations between the Two World Wars (1937), The Twenty Years! Crisis (1939), Conditions of Peace (1942). Nationalism and After (1945), and The Soviet Impact on the Western World (1946). He is now completing a series of lectures at Johns Hopkins University on "German-Soviet Relations between the Two World Wars."

# REGULATIONS GOVERNING UNCLAIMED STUDENT PROPERTY

The following is an excerpt from the regulations which were passed by the Community Council in the meeting of April 29th, 1940 and are still in force:

- 1. All student property which is not kept in the student's room must be tagged. This applies to skis, bicycles, and all articles stored in the attics of the student houses.
- 2. All articles which are untagged and left on the Campus at the close of College in June will be disposed of in a Rummage Sale to be held as early as possible in September.
- 3. The College shall include in the September Rummage Sale any tagged articles which have remained unclaimed at the College for more than one year. The College will communicate with the owners at least two months in advance advising them that their property will be offered for sale if not claimed at once.
- 4. That graduates should not be permitted to leave untagged articles at the College for more than two months after the date of graduation. If the articles are left longer, they too will be included in the September Rummage Sale.
