- As part of the Social Science Colloquium Series, Eric D. Goldstein, Research Director for the Middle East and North Africa division, Human Rights Watch, will speak on the topic, The Arab Spring: What Role - if any - for International Human Rights Advocacy? Mr. Goldstein was a visiting Fellow at the Center for International Studies at Princeton University and has taught at Georgetown and Princeton Universities. He has published many articles and Op-Ed pieces in major newspapers and magazines. Monday, October 31 at 7:00 pm in the CAPA Symposium.
- A screening of the documentary "Crossing Arizona," a collection of personal accounts stemming from Arizona's illegal immigration crisis takes place on Tuesday, November 1, at 7:00 pm in the CAPA Symposium. Human rights activist Mike Wilson is featured in this film and will be a guest lecturer at the College on November 2nd.
- Years ago, retired U.S. Army Special Forces Master Sergeant Mike Wilson was stirred into action by the growing number of migrant deaths occurring on the Tohono O'odham Reservation of southern Arizona. For his humanitarian efforts Wilson has been threatened with banishment and with being labeled a "terrorist." He has been featured in numerous documentaries, including Crossing Arizona (2006) and The 800 Mile Wall (2009). Wilson will lecture on Migrant Deaths in Indian Country: A Violation of Human Rights in the Name of Homeland Security on Wednesday, November 2 at 7:00 pm in the CAPA Symposium.

Marlene will also describe the characteristics associated with popularity for both boys and girls, consider the stability of popularity over time, and describe what we know about the predictive power of popularity through adolescence and into emerging adulthood. The Singles Lottery begins at 6:30 pm, and Doubles, Triples, and Quads Lottery at 7:00 pm.

* Sophomores interested in singles for the spring term will draw numbers to determine the order of the single waitlist and will also fill out a Sophomore Single Preference Form, which will be available at the Lottery. Sophomores can choose to waitlist for a single, but can also reserve a double during the Lottery process.

Applications to live on campus during FWT are available in the Office of Student Life, and are due back by **Friday**, **November 18**.

As a reminder, December 2011 grads are *not* eligible for on-campus housing over FWT.
