The Window Shop, on display today in commons, is not just another specialty store bringing its wares to Bennington. This is a unique organization founded in 1939 to employ and re-train refugees from Hitler's Europe. Since then it has grown into a rather large non-profit

venture selling clothes, gifts, and accessories as well as maintaining a restaurant. It now employs displaced persons and others who find it difficult to obtain work through regular channels. Any profits that are made are used for scholarships and an assistance fund to enable young people to continue their education.
