Another full scholarship will be awarded in June 2019. <u>Applications are open now</u>. The deadline to apply for the January term is Sept. 1, 2018. The deadline to apply for the June 2019 residency is March 1, 2019.

Hall, former United States poet laureate, and longtime Bennington Writing Seminars writer-in-residence, <u>recently passed away</u> at the age of 89. Hall's involvement with the Seminars extends to the program's very beginning. Hall was an old friend of Liam Rector, the Seminars' founder and first director, and he remained deeply involved with the program.

"Poetry is embedded in the soul of the Writing Seminars," said <u>Mark Wunderlich</u>, director. "Our poetry alumni have gone on to win the National Book Award, the Guggenheim, the National Book Critics Circle Award, Pushcart Prizes, Stegner Fellowships, and Rona Jaffe Awards, among other accolades. We are grateful to this generous donor for investing in the genre specifically, at a critically important time, and in the program in general."

During this two-year, low-residency program, students commit as much to reading as to writing and conceive reading lists that strengthen and broaden their knowledge. Students perform critical literary analysis and craft bold new works of fiction, nonfiction, or poetry inspired by their discoveries. They finish with a polished thesis and a parting lecture. All this with the expert guidance of authors who, throughout individualized instruction, become familiar with and develop a stake in students' work.
