Her third, Surname Viet Given Name Nam, won the First Prize Blue Ribbon Award for Best Film-As-Art Feature at the American International Film Festival 1990, First Prize for Film as Art at San Franciso MOMA, and a merit award at the Bombay International Film Festival. Her latest film, Shoot for the Contents, won the Best Cinematography award from the Sundance Film Festival in 1992, was named best experimental feature documentary at the Athens International Film Festival, and toured with the 1993 Biennale of the Whitney Museum. *WISG MONDAY NIGHT VIDEO FESTIVAL

The final series—"Close-Up: Women in the Arts"—of the Women's Issues Study Group's three-part, three-month video festival begins on Monday, May 2, with Georgia O'Keefe. Here, for the first time, O'Keefe appears on camera to talk candidly about her work and life, including her paintings of the mountains and desert of New Mexico, with additional insights from people close to her. The second film, shown on Monday, May 9, is Toni Morrison: Profile of a Writer, winner of the 1993 Nobel Prize for Literature. Intimate interviews and moving readings from her book Beloved, which focuses on the story of Sethe, a black slave and mother. Frieda Kahlo will be shown on Monday, May 16. At the age of 16, Frieda was involved in a road accident that left her in chronic pain and subject to a series of operations. Her paintings reflect her constant struggle with her ravaged body. A close-up look at Mexico's famous surrealist. Lady Day: The Many Faces of Billie Holiday, Monday, May 23. The first video documentary on the woman considered by many to be the greatest jazz singer of all time. All films begin at 9:00 p.m. in the Upstairs Café.

*WRITER GEOFFREY WOLFF READING

Wolff's novels include Bad Debts, The Sightseer, Inklings, Providence, The Final Club, and the forthcoming The Age of Consent. Among his other publications are Black Sun, a biography; an autobiography, The Duke of Deception: Memories of My Father, and a collection of personal essays, A Day at the Beach. His stories, essays, and criticism have appeared in Atlantic Monthly, Esquire, Lear's, Paris Review, and he has been editor or critic for Newsweek, Esquire, and The Washington Post. He is the recipient of numerous honors and awards, among them two NEA and two Guggenheim fellowships. He is currently writer in residence at Brandeis University and has taught at Williams and Middlebury Colleges and Princeton, Brown, Boston, and Columbia Universities. Doctor's appointments should be arranged either through the nurse on duty or the Health Service secretary. Students who miss a doctor's appointment without prior notice will be charged \$10 for that missed appointment. Students who need to be seen by a doctor when the Health Service physician is not in attendance should contact the nurse on duty during Health Service hours or call emergency ext. 210 when Health Service is closed. A trip to the hospital emergency room without prior approval may not be covered by school insurance.

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
