Summer Jobs: Summer job vacancies are listed on the Barn Bulletin Board. This covers jobs in private camps, Girl Scout camps and various other camps for underprivileged children.

There are also some opportunities to work in mental institutions; a school for delinquent girls; and doing recreational work and child care in connection with migrant labor camps.

Bonwit Teller in New York would like applications from two third-year students who would be interested in their Junior Training Program. The salary is \$35.00 a week plus commission.

Jobs for Seniors: We have received notification of job openings for next year which might be of interest to those members of the senior class who have not already made other definite plans. Some of these jobs are posted on the Bulletin Board under the heading, "Jobs For Graduates". They include work for biology or psychology majors at the Jackson Memorial Laboratory in Bar Harbor, Maine; jobs for majors in chemistry or biology at the Massachusetts General Hospital in Boston; and the Memorial Center in New York City.

Seniors who may be interested in teaching can qualify for public school work in Connecticut and in New York by taking a six weeks training course this Summer at one of the State sponsored schools. This can be done at a very small cost.

At the moment we have requests for teachers in two central schools which are introducing art into the school curriculum; as well as requests for teachers in the North Country School at Lake Placid.

There are quite a few job openings in connection with Harvard University and M.I.T. for typists, stenographers, laboratory assistants, research assistants

and course assistants. This latter is for economic majors.
