

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### THE LEOPARD

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This performance by the Bennington College Dance Group is part of the Non-resident Term of Bennington College in which students obtain practical training in varied fields of interest. The students spend ten weeks of each winter away from college, supplementing their resident study with actual participation in activities in which they are interested.

The members of the Group, nine girls and one man (a special student in dance at Bennington), have directed, choreographed, and costumed the whole production under the supervision of the Bennington College Dance Faculty.

Although Dance is a major field of study at Bennington, many of the students enrolled in dance classes are majors in drama and music or in the social sciences or literature.

All of them, however, participate in the Non-resident Term Projects as rewarding, broadening experiences contributing immeasurably to a general liberal arts education.
