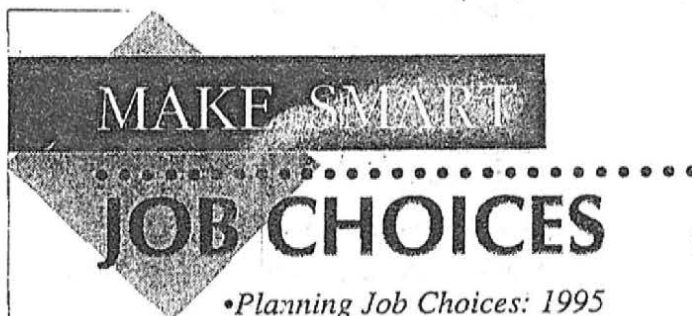

A trip to the hospital emergency room without prior approval may not be covered by school insurance.
