In connection with the exhibit of Mr. Smith's work now on display in the Lounge of the Carriage Barn, at 5:10 on Wednesday Mr. Smith will demonstrate the process by which these monotypes were done. They have been exhibited at various places in New York and else where and have attracted great interest. A number of them were purchased last winter by the Museum of Modern Art.

Harold Gray, who is coming to speak on Thursday evening, was a member of the Bennington College faculty from 1933 to 1939, acting president during Mr. Leigh's first sabbatical, and is now Dean of Bard College.
