The committee approved a corrected copy of the minutes of 5/2, as follows:

SEPC Minutes

May 2, 1979

Absent: Keven Vance, Literature, Katie Ringer, Dance.

Feter reported that Stephen Maynes has quit FEPC. Leslie Weber was designated as his replacement.

Peter reported on the Faculty Meeting which was held earlier in the afternoon. A student presentation was given on the idea of a grade option at Bennington. Peter Kaplan spoke about the advantages of a grade option for a student contemplating gradua te school. Barry Weinbaum, after reading the Vanguard editorial in favor of the grade option, presented as evidence of student opinion the results of the resent poll (Of students responding, the majoritwere in favor of having the option to receive grades.). After discussion, the Faculty agreed to commit the issue to FEPC for further discussion.

It was generally agreed that distributing the minutes of FEPC discussion of the grades issue would probably be useful.

Mark Barnes proposed a motion, which was amended to read as follows:

Whereas the present graduating class is the first class not to have the option of grades, and thus the full effects of the np-grade system have not yet been ascertained, we the SEPC reaffirm our committment to the current system (no grades). We recommend that no action be taken on the present sytem until a complete study is undertaken and the full effects of the present system can be thoroughly determined.

After discussion the motion was put to a vote and passed, 15 in favor, 1 opposed.

The committee passed the following motion: May 5, 1979\_

SEPC will approve the minutes of each meeting in the following meeting and publish the minutes the same week they are approved except for the announcements that require immediate publication.

This motion was approved, 9 in favor, 1 opposed

## ANNOUNCEMENT

The following was passed:

SEPC urges the Dean of Studies to conduct a survey of graduating seniors in an attempt to determine the effect of our current evaluation system on graduate school admission. This should be done immediately. The following are examples of the areas the SEPC would like to see covered in the case of each individual student: Was there application to graduate school? How many schools received applications? List them by names. How many have responded to date? How many acceptances? List them. Did the schools request an interview? List. Was an interview conducted ? List where.

Given the small size of the gradua ting class and that many of the facts required can be obtained through the office of the registrar, SEPC sees no reason why returns of close to 100% cannot be anticipated.

## STUDENT COUNCIL MINUTES

MEETING STARTED 6:05

MAY 8, 1979

absent: Mc Cullough, Stokes, Hill House, Ludlow, Library, Van Ben., Welling

Council discussed the security reles suggested by Peter Bling. People questioned the policy of not letting any visitors not directly associated with the school come on campus (for Friday night parties, for example).

Pam Nicholson proposed the motion that visitors either be met at the security gate by the student they are visiting, or the visitor has to leave an identification card with Security and state the purport of their visit. Nine people voted for the motion, two against, one abstention.

(In the migdle of the discussion on this motion, a car was driven across the Lawn making marks in the grass. Several members ran to catch the car. After the car was stopped at the security gate the meeting was promptly called back to order.)

It was discovered that the Constitution states, "Voting members of the Judicial Committee shall not concurrently hold other elective positions and no student shall serve as voting member for two consecutive terms." This excludes five of the seven members withe Committee.

Anita Stephen proposed a motion that Council either get new members for the Judiciary Committee, or change the clause in the Constitution. One person voted to elect new members, eight people voted to change the clause, two people abstained. An election to amend the constitution will be held May 22, 1979.

The house chairpeople asked Council to approve the request that house chairpeople.get the status of seniors when drawing for rooms. Points were made that students would be encouraged to be house chairpeople to get a single room and that it was unfair to seniors to wait four years for a quiet single room and have it taken by a younger house chairperson.

Pam Nicholson proposed the motion that house chairpersons keep their status they would normally have when drawing for rooms. Seven people voted for the motion, five people voted against the motion.

Jeff Sarnoff requested money for the Sun Festival.

Pam Nicholson proposed the motion that Student Council give the Recreation Committee the remaining money for the Sun Festival (minimum of \$109.00). Eight people voted for the motion, three people voted against the motion.
