#### Archive Committee:

Leslie Weber spoke for the Archive Committee, a sub-committee of S.E.P.C. formed to examine S.E.P.C.'s procedural guide lines, and requested each S.E.P.C. member to list the duties and responsibilities peculiar to his division as a result of his membership in S.E.P.C.

#### Black Music Division:

Stephen Haynes informed the S.E.P.C. members of the current impositions that the Black Music Division has been facing since its recent move to the Carriage Barn. The refurbishing that was promised to be completed by the start of this term was not started until 2 weeks before the term's commencement. Currently the division's classes are being interrupted by the cocophany of construction noises and as a result of the delay in the starting date of the repairs and certain divisional deadlines, students have had to take it upon themselves to complete much of the work left unfinished by the carpenters. Other work and systems expected have been refused.

Holly Markush added the the Black Music division has recently been informed that there will be no provisions made for a Master's Program with in the division. This news comes as a suprise because they were promised allocations for this project. The Administration has provided no explanation for this decision.

#### Forms Committee:

Daniel Porcher proposed the S.E.P.C. Committee vote to form a subcommittee to examine the effectiveness of the present forms and to devise new ones.

The motion was taken to a vote: 9 members were in favor of such action and 1 opposed. The motion was passed.

### Committee Reports

- Art and Architecture - no report; they had not yet had a meeting;
- Library - Anita Stephen reported that there was discussion concerning the role of the committee; it was concluded that they are an advisory committee;
- Pet - no report; they had not yet had a meeting;
- Admissions - no report; they meet every other week;
- S.E.P.C. - Andrea Loselle reported that the funds expected to be allocated to the representatives that had done all of the "paper work" last semester would be disregarded due to the monetary problems of the Student Council.
- Health - no report; they had not yet had a meeting;

Paul Renzi came to the meeting to discuss the possibility of having Seilers run the Cafe. The primary reason for this change is monetary; Paul believes that, under Seilers' management, the Cafe could not only make up for its present \$2000.00 deficit, but also it could be run at a profit. He suggested that the grill from the snack bar could be moved in to the Cafe and that some of the food could be prepared upstairs in the big kitchen. He stressed that no changes would be made in the menu of the Cafe if the students did not want any, and the students have the right to kick Seilers out at any time. Noa Ben-Amotz made the point that she tries not to add any preservatives and that she uses only the best cuts of meat. Paul said that she could use a less expensive meat and that, in a sandwich, no one would be able to tell the difference.

Sarah Kahn made a motion that a committee be formed to find out exactly what would be entailed in Seilers running the Cafe that would include Paul Renzi and Noa Ben-Amotz. The motion passed unanimously. The students on the Committee are Barry Horowitz, Kevin Haney, Holly Block, Steve Williamson, David Ellison, and John Silivstrini.

Francie Issenman requested on behalf of all of the Senior class a minimum of \$1000.00 for the senior party at the end of the semester. One concern that was made seven times with seven different minor variations was that the Student Council budget is very small and that the Seniors should not expect the \$1000.00. In answer to this nine different people said at various times that the Seniors deserve the money and that it was one of the few traditions in the school--after all one day you will be a senior too. (or something to that effect) Francie had mentioned that she was talking to Bernie Iser to see if the College could give some money--in addition to the Student Council fund. There was considerable confusion concerning this point (such as would the College be supplementing the Student Council allotment or subsidizing it) and six times it had to be reexplained. A motion was proposed by Jeff Russack that the Student Council guarantee the Seniors \$1000.00 for their party at the end of the spring term. Eleven people voted for the motion, four abstained. (please note the word "guarantee")

The Recreation Committee submitted a new budget. They requested,

To cut the budget suggestions were made to exclude the Sun Festival from the Rec. Committee's budget and and make it an independent item for the Student Council to vote on, cut payments for waiters/waitresses, cups, supplies for Nightclub, cut payment for miscellaneous supplies (get them from maintenance and houses), cut payment for three person clean up crew, cut payment for tapes (no one ever used to charge for making them). At some point during these budget cut suggestions the President of the Recreation Committee, Brynn Collier, resigned. Jeff Sarnoff, the only willing candidate, was voted to be Brynn's successor.

Missy Ix proposed a motion that discussion concerning the Recreation Comm.'s budget be tabled until the next meeting when the exact figures for the Student Council budget were known. Nine people voted for the motion, one against, one abstaintion.

Kevin Farley talked to Bernie Iser about the possibilities ff getting some kind of liquor license. An all purpose license costs approxiamtely \$400.00 and a beer and wine license is approximately \$300.00. The insurance to cover the College if a license was obtained would probably be doubled from the amount we already pay. A motion was prosed to ask Bernie Iser to examine all avenues of obtaining a liquor license and figure out how much it would cost. Eleven people voted for the motion, one person abstined. Motion passed.

Randy Witlicki prosed a motion that the parking ticket fee be lowered to \$1.00, as is the fee in the town of Bennington, after Peter Blind gives his proposed ticket regulations. Motion passed- nine people voted for the motion, one person voted against it.

The following reccmmendation was presented to the Student Council by the House Chairpersons, that there be a total ban on pets for the fall of 1979. Discussion was tabled until next week when the pet committee had met.

Jamie Kelter announced that Carol Cartwright is presently working with Jamie on films and that next year Carol will be the head of the Film Society.

Jeff Sarnoff and Sarah Kahn are on the Community Relations Committee. Tim Littlefield, Carolyn Healy, Andy Messinger, Liz Schultz are on the Sports Committee. Danzia Franklin and Laura Shelton are on the Grants Committee. Selina Davis and Kim Barton are new members of the Library Committee. Chris Baker and Gary Freeman are new members of the pet Committee.

Randy Witlicki proposed a motion that a letter be given to the Administratic that any decisions about the food services should be discussed with the Students before becoming final. Motion passed unanimously.
