1. Graduate Teaching Fellow's project
by Letitia Evans, "Prairie Passage",
which is based on the 19th Century west-
ward movement in the United States. It
is a collective expression of the journey
and the joy of achievement ritualized
through the celebration and memory of
travels at the moment of arrival.

2. Suzanne Kaplan's senior project,
"Puritan Allegory", which has been adap-
ted from Nathaniel Hawthorne's The
Scarlet Letter and is based on the ten-
sions between public morality and indi-
vidual necessity, formalized as the
passage of the protagonist back through
her own experience in an attempt to dis-
cover, in the conflicting extremes, that
peculiar amalgam which Hawthorne broadly
states as "the truth of the human heart".

In addition to these longer works
there will be solo, duet and group dances
to the music of Milhaud, Prokofieff,
Willaert and others. A more complete
program will be printed next week.
