For 1973-74, 2 additional black students (both male) were accepted as Black Music Undergraduate Fellows.

Figures released by the Office of Civil Rights of HEW and reported in the Chronicle of Higher Education show 212 black students enrolled in all Vermont colleges and universities, including Bennington as of Fall, 1970, Vermont's proportion of black undergraduates (212 out of 17,00) is far less than the 11.2% black people constitute of the country's population, although it is greater than the proportion of blacks in the state population, less than 1,000 out of 444,000.
