READING Former Bennington College faculty member, Harry Mathews was born in New York City in 1930 and lives there and in France. He spent the years from 1952 to 1978 in Europe, chiefly in France, and has been, since 1972, a member of the Ouvroir de littérature potentielle in Paris. His books of poems include The Ring (Julliard), The Planisphere and Trial Impressions (both published by Burning Deck in Providence, R1), and Le Savoir de rois (Bibliothèque oulipienne); his poems have appeared in anthologies and in such journals as Grand Street. Hudson Review, Locus Solus, New Magazine, and Quarterly Review. As noted above. Mathews is also the author of a number of works of prose fiction, most recently the novel Cigarettes (forthcoming from Weidenfeld & Nicolson). He was the recipient of a 1981 National Endowment for the Arts grant in fiction. Supported by the Callie Goldstein Memorial Fund. A display of his work is at the Crossett Library now through May 26.
