Other work has appeared in <i>Harper's</i> , <i>The New York Times Magazine</i> , <i>The Paris Review</i> , <i>Tin House, GQ, The Yale Review, Bookforum</i> , and <i>The Best American Essays 2012</i> .
	Jill McCorkle is the author of ten books—four story collections and six novels—five of which have been selected as <i>New</i> <i>York Times</i> Notable Books.
