*WILLIAM GASS

Writer William Howard Gass will present the eighteenth Ben Belitt Lecture, "I've Got a Little List." Gass is a novelist, short story writer, philosopher, and essayist. An experimentalist, he is considered to be a seminal figure in American metafiction. He established his reputation in the late 1960s with the novels Omensetter's Luck and Willie Masters' Lonesome Wife and the story collection In the Heart of the Heart of the Country. Throughout the 1970s and 1980s Gass turned his attention to essays on philosophy and literature, publishing Fiction & the Figures of Life, On Being Blue, The World Within the World, and The Habitations of the Word. In 1995 Gass returned to fiction with a new novel, The Tunnel. A reception will follow the talk. Martha Hill Dance Workshop, 8:15 p.m.

SCHOLARSHIP OPPORTUNITY TO STUDY ABROAD

The National Security Education Program (NSEP) awards scholarships to American undergraduates to study in regions outside of Western Europe, Canada, Australia, and New Zealand. NSEP scholarship awards are available for a maximum of \$8,000 per semester or \$16,000 per academic year. Any student who is interested in applying for this scholarship should contact Henrietta Marshall, Assistant Dean of the College, Barn 50, ext. 226. The campus deadline for the application to be completed is November 15, 1995. Students may apply for study in summer 1996 (freshmen and sophomores only) or for fall 1996 and spring 1997. ATTENTION FACULTY

USA Today is enlisting your support in selecting the nation's best and brightest college students. Students must be nominated by a faculty member. The criteria are designed to find students who excel not only in scholarship but in leadership roles on and off campus. A key element given most weight by judges will be a student's outstanding original academic and intellectual product. The judges will be influenced by the student's ability to describe that outstanding endeavor in his/her own words. They will not read an author's work, see an artist's painting, or hear a composer's music. They will rely solely on the student's ability to describe the effort in writing, supplemented by recommendations from the nominating professor and up to three other persons of the nominee's choice. Nominations must be postmarked by November 17, 1995 and competition is limited to full-time undergraduates. Nomination forms are available in the Office of the Dean of the College, Henrietta Marshall, Barn 50. Transcripts are also needed for the nomination, and the Dean's office will need two weeks' leeway time in order to process the transcript.

A trip to the hospital emergency room without prior approval may not be covered by school insurance. A college physician is available Monday, Wednesday, and Friday for clinic hours. Check with Health Service for exact hours. Doctor's appointments should be arranged either through the nurse on duty or the Health Service secretary. Students who miss a doctor's appointment without prior notice will be charged \$10 for that missed appointment.

PROGRAM IN PUBLIC & COMMUNITY SERVICE NEWSLETTER

Listed below is an updated description of volunteer opportunities. In most cases, the first step for anyone interested is to contact Ron Cohen in Bam 80 (ext. 113) for more complete information about each position and advice about how best to proceed. Unless otherwise specified, these positions are intended primarily for students. However, other interested members of the community are invited to inquire as well. Unless otherwise noted, all positions are available immediately. If you are interested in listing a position in these occasional Newsletters, please contact Ron Cohen.

PAVE (PROJECT AGAINST VIOLENT ENCOUNTERS).

Advocates needed to serve as a hotline worker, court advocate, safe-home provider, or community educator. No prior experience nor particular skills required. Training will be provided beginning October 12.

THE NORTH BENNINGTON GRADED SCHOOL (K-6).

The College is developing a continuing collaboration with the school, and the following opportunities are currently available:

- 1. Classroom assistant in combined first- and second-grade to work with individual children or small groups of children in various curricular areas.
- Spanish instructor in combined first- and second-grade to work with students for two half-hour periods each week.
- Work in the Discovery Program, a program for gifted and talented

students in foreign language and international cultures. Two hours each week for 8-10 weeks. Grades K-3 and 4-6. Each group has 12 students and 2 instructors available.

- 4. Teach French to a class of 14 fourth graders. The class would meet three times each week (Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday) from 2:25 p.m. to 3 p.m. Most appropriate would be an advanced student or native speaker of French.

 5. Individual student tutor. An adult male student to work with a 6th grade student on various types of writing and computing. One- or two-hour blocks between 9:15 a.m. and 3 p.m.
- 6. International students to assist classroom teachers and teach about various aspects of their culture; minimum of 5-10 hours/week during the coming Field Work Term. With approval of teachers and principal, students may also teach topics of their own interest. Applications (letter of interest, description of proposed teaching ideas, resume) due in Bam 80 no later than Monday, October 16 at 5 p.m.

BENNINGTON HEAD START.

1. Classroom/Activity Assistant. Assist Head Start teachers by bringing interests, talents, skills, and hobbies into the classroom--in music, puppetry, dance, drama, and intercultural games. This position also encompasses daily classroom routines (loading and unloading busses, meals, outdoor play, classroom supervision, and cleaning, all under a teacher's direction). No background experience nor training required, only enthusiasm in sharing interests with young children.

- 2. Partnering. Become a familiar face to a child who needs some guidance in classroom social interactions by bringing the child into the activities of the group in appropriate ways. This includes language and behavior modeling, and building the child's self-esteem as part of the group. Background in psychology or child development required, as is experience with young children. Position involves some degree of physical activity, in indoor and outdoor play.
- 3. Tutors for Parents. Either one-onone, working on math or literacy education, or with small groups, particularly helping to prepare for upcoming examinations, such as for a Driver's Permit. Monday or Tuesday, from 10 a.m. - 12 noon.
- 4. Child Care. Caring for children while parents are attending small classes. Wednesday evenings, 6 p.m. 8 p.m.

PROSPECT NURSING HOME.

Volunteers to assist Activity Director in planned therapeutic activities for residents. Activities normally scheduled for periods of 1/2 or 1 hour during the day, as well as evenings and weekends.
